## Life Reflections

Today's scripture comes from Philippians 4:13, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." The title of today's sermon is "Lord, I Tried." I am going to talk about three points:

- Route 66
- One more night with the frogs
- God's presence has made the difference.

Let's turn to Isaiah 35, Verse 8. "And a highway will be there; it will be called the Way of Holiness; it will be for those who walk on that Way."

Since there are 66 books in the Bible, it seems the Bible is our road map. As I look back over my life, I see God's hand. It all started out like this: join me on my journey to and on Route 66.....

Isaac Singleton was born to Ruben and Sarah Singleton on March 31, 1928 in Tallulah,
Louisiana. He is described by his double firstcousin, Roberta Sims, as a person who enjoyed having fun. Roberta and Isaac were both the only children in their families. "I was like his little sister," she remembers fondly.

Since childhood, he was known for his singing ability, according to longtime friend, Perry Bennett. "I met him in Louisiana while he was singing in a quartet group when he was 10 or 11. At that time, he had long pretty black hair and he was skinny," says Bennett with a laugh. "He was one of the greatest."

After he graduated high school, in 1944, Singleton volunteered to go into the U.S. Army Air Corps.

"My dad never talked much about his military experience but I recall one story in particular in which he flew a mission in the Pacific Theatre where he went up against the Japanese Zeros as a tail gunner," said his son Bill. "He said that suddenly all around him, the Zeros came down from above and began to fire on his plane. He began to fire back and he said it happened so fast and was over so quickly, that he didn't have time to think but he just started firing his gun. After landing, he couldn't get out of the air craft. He was trapped and the emergency response team had to cut him out of the plane. Then he said he then went to sign up for a bombardier training. He said he didn't want any part of what he had experienced again."

When he got out, two years later, he moved to Los Angeles, California, which was the beginning of his journey on Route 66. On this material highway, Route 66 runs from Chicago to Los Angeles and covers eight states; Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California. Singleton lived in California for a year.

In 1947, he came back to Louisiana and married his high school sweetheart, Pearlie Beatrice Dexter. "I didn't really like him at first, but that changed," says Pearl. "He was what I wanted in a husband. He was a Christian, he worked hard and he was very nice. He was also very handsome. He was clean-cut and wore

ironed khaki pants. He definitely wasn't a lazy person. He was very ambitious, and didn't mind working." Isaac Singleton Sr. and Pearlie Beatrice Singleton became husband and wife on September, 12, 1947. They have been married for 63 years. Six children were born to this union, Gloria Singleton-Hayes, Isaac Singleton Jr., Charles Edward Singleton, Barbara Ann Singleton Edwards, Valerie Jean Singleton and Willie Darren Singleton. The couple has 19 grandchildren, nine great-grandchildren and four great-great-grandchildren. Pearl Singleton said that every day of their married life, he told her he loved her. "I think God put us together for a purpose. It was divine order to bring people into the world to love the Lord and draw others to Christ."

The couple moved to Saginaw, Michigan, and then to Joliet in 1951 where they joined the Mt. Zion Baptist Church under Pastor J.W. Hill.

"When Singleton came to Joliet he was in a quartet group from Saginaw," says Tim Jones. "In 1953, we formed a group called the Wings of Wonder. Singleton led most of our songs. We use to tour in Mississippi, Tennessee, Louisiana and Indiana. I remember this one place we sung in South Bend, Indiana; I started out singing 'Christian Automobiles' and he came behind me and tore up the church with 'Move in the Room with the Lord.' Everybody was shouting. People were asking who was that bad dude. When Singleton's sang his favorite song "hallelujah"; when he did, he would wreck the house out. Rev. Singleton was different from everybody else

around here. It was noticeable. I have never seen him take a drink or use a curse word. He was the closest I have ever had as a brother." Singleton left the group when he went into seminary in 1957.

Singleton was called to the ministry at the age of 30 while a deacon at Mt. Zion Baptist Church. He began pastoring at his first church, the Russell Street Church of Christ in Centerville, Illinois while attending seminary school at Lincoln Christian College in Lincoln. He later pastored the Colette Street Church of Christ in Danville.

In December, 1961, he became the pastor of the Mt. Zion Baptist Church in Joliet. Pastor Singleton said he's most thankful to God for giving him this opportunity and sustaining him for 47 years in the ministry. "I am also proud of the people who have grown with me," he said. "Mt. Zion and I have grown together. The accomplishments that have been attained far exceed any imagination I had in December, 1961." Under his leadership, the membership has grown from 100 to more than 2,000 members. "It makes my cup overflow to see what God has done," said Singleton.

In 1986, because of his national notoriety in the Civil Rights movement, he was one of 150 African-American pastors invited to the White House by President Ronald Reagan to consult on Civil Rights issues.

"There is no doubt that Isaac Singleton was the center of change," says Pastor Calvin Quarles of Bolingbrook Community Church. "Change that occurred in Will County during the Civil Rights movement was mostly due to Isaac Singleton's leadership. He was the voice of the movement. When I was in serious trouble, he came to my rescue as I was one of the students arrested during the riots at Joliet West in the 1960s. I was accused of inciting a riot. I was arrested along with other students for standing up for our rights at Joliet West. When we were arrested, Isaac Singleton insisted on our release."

Singleton said: "These students were in a cafeteria strategizing on how they could get a black on the cheerleading and pompon squads. There were no black board members and no one to voice their sentiments to. They were just trying to come up with a strategy to get a black board member and a black to work on the yearbook committee. The administration thought the young people were meeting to form a gang. At the time, 2,800 students were attending Joliet West and 125 of them were black. At the time, I worked at Sears Roebuck, I left my job and couldn't believe what I saw, the police were running the black students around the school like they were rabbits."

"I got a bus and brought the students to Mt.

Zion Baptist Church," added Singleton. "I met with the parents and students and I later went to the school and asked the principal to let the students go to class. He called the superintendent and she said no and also advised that they couldn't make up their classes." While negotiating with school administration for the students to return back to school and receive proper credit, Singleton organized a freedom

school at Mt. Zion until they went back two weeks later.

During the 1960s, Singleton fought for the right to vote. He participated in several marches with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., including Montgomery, Alabama. "I'll never forget as we were coming down Confederate Square, people were shouting 'niggers go back to Africa.' People were vicious. They were hanging out of windows. The one thing to remember about this march was there were whites and all races working together here and people from all denominations -- all marching for blacks to have the right to vote."

Pastor Perry Bennett recalls the days of the nationwide riots after the death of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. "A lot of trouble was kept down in Joliet because of Pastor Singleton," says Bennett. "He and I were the only two preachers who walked the streets. He was called crazy and was told that people would kill him, but this didn't stop him. I didn't want him to go by himself so I went with him. The people had a respect for him and listened to him and he calmed them down and talked to them. He saved a lot of buildings from being burned. He was never afraid and never backed down. He was always a leader."

The next point is to never spend one more night with the frogs. Moses was chosen by God to tell Pharaoh to let the people go. Pharaoh ignored the demand and experienced 10 plagues. On Pastor Singleton's journey on Route 66, he witnessed many injustices. He, like Moses, was chosen to help God's people. Singleton accepted the call.

Imagine how miserable the people of Egypt felt with frogs everywhere. The frogs had over taken them. They were even jumping out of their water. Pastor Isaac Singleton stood for justice. He refused to look injustice in the face and spend one more night with the frogss. He stood and acted and did not wait for next day.

During the 1960s, Singleton was instrumental in changing business practices within Joliet. "I remember a group of us met with the NAACP president and gathered in a restaurant that served coffee to blacks for 50 cents and 15 cents for whites," said Singleton. "We filled the place up and as a white person left, a black person came in." As a result, the vote passed for open occupancy in Joliet.

Singleton also recalls the days in the 1960s when his wife, Pearl, worked at a restaurant which wouldn't serve him coffee. The waitress served both people on each side of him. "She advised 'we don't serve color people here.' I told her 'I don't eat them either, I just want some coffee." She got the manager and he told him that white people didn't want to eat with colored and he couldn't eat there. He went into the kitchen and removed his wife from the establishment.

Singleton says his motivation for justice was prompted by not being able to ride the bus to school as a child and teen-ager. Often the white students on the bus threw rocks at him. One day he threw rocks back at them. That was his way of saying no to the injustice.

In the 1970s, Mt. Zion built a new church. The congregation went from a small church with outside toilets to the present home now located at 402 Singleton Place. "I didn't know anything about building a church. I have always consulted God. We needed \$500,000 to build the church, all we had was \$50,000. I negotiated all the material, got contractors and we used our own people of Mt. Zion to build the church. After the church was built, it was paid for within three years."

The 1970s also represented a time in history when Singleton helped people obtain jobs. He organized Operation Bread Basket (PUSH) here in Joliet. "As we got more freedom, racism was used to prevent (people from getting jobs) and ridding people of jobs," says Pastor Singleton. "I didn't like it. Many people came to me who lost their jobs and I worked to get their jobs back."

The 1980s were all about education. "I was concerned about our young people going out and getting a good education. To motivate them, I put in action our honor roll system. Education has always been important to me. I wish I had the opportunity many young people have today. Every grading period, young people on the honor roll come forward during a special time in the service to be recognized," said Singleton. Mt. Zion also has scholarship funding. "As a result, young people who would not have gone to college can go and are now business leaders, physicians, instructors, attorneys and etcetera," added Singleton.

In 1985, the Family Life Center, a multipurpose facility, was added to the church. It
houses a full basketball court, 23 classrooms, a
commercial kitchen, locker rooms, showers and a
banquet hall. The building valued at \$3.9 million
was paid off in eight years. His vision and the
purpose of this facility were to keep the children
off the street and to educate them. This was all
part of the church motto "Dedicated to serve the
whole man: Mind, body and spirit."

The 1990s were a time of travel; Pastor
Singleton preached in six of the seven continents.
"Singleton is a motivator, a molder and a
minister," says Former Pastor Hector Edwards,
who came to Mt. Zion in 1981. The former pastor
of Mt. Olive Baptist Church said "he has the ability
to lead people, challenge them and bring out the
best in them. The doctrine he teaches is sound
and anyone who has sat under him as I have will
tell you it has enhanced their spiritual walk with
the Lord. He is a leader who demonstrates
ministry beyond Mt. Zion and the United States.
His mission and passion has inspired me." Mt.
Zion has built two churches in Africa and has
funded many foreign mission projects.

Singleton said his first sermon as pastor of Mt. Zion was titled "The presences of God makes the Difference". "God has blessed me to live, he has blessed me in my living, and He's blessed the work I try to do for Him." When asked how he would like to be remembered, he said "that I love people, love God and tried to help someone. I want people to say, I followed God for it was He who has enabled me to do what I have done. I am


so proud and grateful for all God has done through me."

After Pastor Singleton retired in March of 2009, he became Pastor Emeritus. He often said he retired from pastoring, but not from preaching. The call remained on his life and he continued to preach and teach the gospel.

Hundreds of weddings, hundreds of baby dedications, and hundreds of funerals were performed as well as thousands of souls have been saved. A world full of believers and unbelievers lives' have been changed after knowing the love of Jesus Christ through the Reverend Dr. Isaac Singleton.






